Free One-Week Summer Seminar for Teachers in All Disciplines

Assume the roles of student and teacher in this seminar as you deepen your knowledge of the Holocaust and Jewish culture and refine your teaching practice. You will

- Use a multi-disciplinary, social-justice focused inquiry process to explore past and recent genocides.
- Hear from a variety of speakers including Holocaust survivors, writers, educators, scholars, and a rabbi.
- Visit local resources including National Yiddish Book Center; the Institute for Holocaust, Genocide, and Memory Studies; the Jewish Community of Amherst.
- Develop curriculum materials and strategies for teaching about the Holocaust and other genocides.
